KHOJ - the programmes

In the recent past most of our work has been focused around the integration of various laws meant for the welfare and development of the tribal and indigenous communities and other forest dwellers and in empowering them to convert these into tangible resources that either support their livelihoods or helps in conserving the ecology. Secondly we continue our efforts to help increase the access and quality of the health and nutrition services provided by the agencies of the State to the women and children of Melghat and adjoining areas. Our interventions in the court have led to some significant systemic changes while on a few we keep struggling with a hope to make an impact.

In this journey we have been supported by various partners and programmes that we have evolved with them to meet our vision of empowering Gram Sabha's to be able to become the real decision making bodies in areas of livelihoods, conservation, and development.

Some of our milestones in the last two years have been as shared below-

1. Initiation of a new partnership with VSTF (Village Social Transformation Foundation) Mumbai wherein we had opportunity to engage with young people from indigenous or forest dwelling communities as the changemakers their village of



through convergence of various government programmes, especially



the flagship programmes of the Government and also that of the organisation.

Hence with the focus on CFR villages where rights of the community over forest rights has

been recognized, we focused on the issues of the villages prioritized by them under the Village Development Plans approved by them and their Panchayats. This programme covers 35 villages from 10 Gram Panchayats in Achalpur and Chikaldhara block.

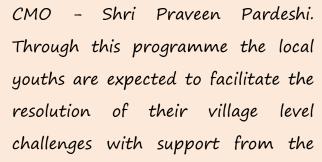
This process now in second year, has given us some good young energetic people who are making efforts to bring about change in all indicators pertaining to health and sanitation, education, livelihoods, conservation, agriculture, animal husbandry and development of the community.





The process in the initial phase was guided and supported by the District Collector Shri Abhijit Bangar and Additional Chief Secretary







government agencies. These villages are priority for transformation targets in the State. VSTF provides an amount of Rs Ten Lakhs per village to meet their needs not enlisted in other government

programmes.

2. Convergence of governmental programmes - In post CFR situation, where communities are governing their forests and managing it sustainably, the administration is by law bound to support the process of convergence of all other programmes to support their developmental or conservation requirements.

During the last few years this has become our core strategy wherein we spend organizational resources only on those programmes that cannot be supported through Governmental programmes, rest we try and pursue to be done through Government funds. Convergence with NREGA provides great scope for soil moisture conservation works, for plantation and for other

developmental programmes of individual benefit like Cattleshed/ Toilets/ PMAY etc.

- 3. Recreating Aamrai Mango orchards were traditionally found in many forest areas however slowly these trees are fast getting extinct due to grazing or illicit felling in the forests. Hence we thought of rebuilding these Aamrai for the future generations. In this plan we gave 500 saplings to 11 villages that dug pits for plantation voluntarily. Out



of these approximately 400 were mango saplings of both native

- and fast growing varieties and rest were fruit bearing trees useful for birds and animals in the forest. Approximately 17500 saplings were planted by the people.
- 4. Seed Development During the last year, approximately 100 acres of land was covered under Chana seed plantation in collaboration with a programme called CAIM/Krushi Samrudhhi. This gave people an opportunity to increase their income through seed production using less water and in lower costs. The process was duly registered. Overall there was an yield of 7 quintals on an average per acre. The market rate was approximately 4000 per quintal for those who could not hold and stock.
- 5. Tendu Collection and Management- Collection of minor forest produce of tendu is an activity that is spread across 43 villages and that allows the village community to collectively work on its

management. It is an opportunity to strengthen both Conservation and Governance of the villages and brings about participation of the villagers in the process. The total turnover of tendu for the year 2017 was approximately 1.14crores and the anticipated turnover for the 2018 was 1.33 crores. This entire



finance is managed by the Federation of the Gram Sabha's. KHOJ works as their legal and technical consultant in the process overseeing the veracity of the entire process.

6. CFR Management plans- The process of preparation of Management and Conservation plans for another 20 CFR villages has been initiated since November 2018. We have already completed a similar process with 24 villages



from Melghat and Achalpur region. This process will engage with the village Gram Sabha's in their training capacity building on the provisions of the Act, Exposure to the functioning villages and assisting in mapping their existing resources. Based on the data and village needs, the CFR management plans shall be prepared with the Gram Sabha.

7. Dam De silting at Khadimal village — Villages with special needs like Khadimal which is a water scarce village had a pending demand to help increase water availability in the summer. Desilting and deepening of two of the dams has been carried on in two phases in the last two years and the storage increased considerably for over a couple of months. However even this was not enough and hence we requested the Government to further deepen the tank and plug some of the leakages as well as some minor repairs. Hopefully in the next season, if there is even an average rainfall, Khadimal should be able to manage its water needs.

8. Environment Education programme-Conducting environment education trails/ programmes and camps has become part of our





activities as we need to engage with the younger children to be able to help them continue their association with the forests and natural resources. Schools based activities are held in over 40 villages and occasional camps give children a space for their own creative learning and expression. We hope to be able to expand this area of work in our near future.

9. Health and Nutrition Support Programme – Our health and nutritional support programme aims to strengthen the quality of services on the ground level by constant dialogue with the health

and district administration and addressing policy level concerns through the meetings of the Chief Secretary led Core Committee, follow up of the orders of the



High Court and through individual/ family based counseling for women and children who need medical care and attention. It is often that doctors call up our teams for assistance in counseling and follow up patients who refuse to go to hospital, we not just



help these patients reach the facility but constantly follow up till they return so that their faith and trust in the

health system is built and restored and they do not undergo a bad experience, that would desist them from seeking further services.

10. Our efforts to support the villages in core area of the Melghat Tiger Reserve with livelihood options has been successful to some

extent in Madizadap wherein we have been able to install 5 solar pumps that not just give drinking water to the people but also provide irrigation support to the villagers for their second crop and to some even a third



round of vegetable cultivation. Seeing the result of this work, people from neighboring villages started asking for similar support. We helped them apply to the MEDA MSEDCL driven Solar pump drive and a few farmers have got their pumps installed in the farm while many applications are yet pending for clearance. But this experiment has brought a great awareness amongst the people. There are still people who need assistance with either a borewell or the pump and we try and raise support for the poorest of the poor people in the villages.
